



HO SCALE NEWS. Most of the activity on the HO layout has been maintenance and members learning some of the electronics. Paul Jasiczek continues to work on Shelbina while Derek White keeps replacing the mainline.

The sub-roadbed in the ore dock area was upgraded and straightened out and holes are being made in the wall for track. We are waiting for a track plan to be submitted for approval which will be the next step.

NEW DOOR AND CEILING REPAIRS. Ever since the Red Arrow mangled our premises the rear interior door was difficult to close and had gotten to the point that you almost had to throw a shoulder in to it to get it shut. Also there is the absolutely hideous grease trap over blocks 2 & 5 on the HO layout.

It took some time and unfortunately some money but we finally found a contractor willing to fix both of the problems. After the existing frame and door was removed the small wall was rebuilt and a new door assembly complete with a window was installed. The passenger station wall remained but needed a little bit of cosmetic work.





Hiding the grease trap was another matter. Fortunately we only had to down the layout one night and even that was optional but rather than risk damage by removing the plastic and putting it back a few times we opted to just leave it all in place and get it done.





HOn3 NEWS. The push was on to get the double trestles permanently in place for the 50th weekend and HOn3 crew did not let us down. A special nod goes to them for the extra effort. If you have not seen the trestles you need to stop over and take a peek. The broken lights in the town were repaired while the now retired Dr. W.
